Notes from Reno

Nearly twenty members of the Urban Wildlife Working Group (UWWG) were present at the annual meeting held September 27, 2001 as a part of The Wildlife Society 8th Annual Conference in Reno, Nevada. Lowell Adams, then Chair, reported that current UWWG membership was approximately 120 individuals.

Newly elected UWWG officers were installed at the Reno meeting as well. Members had a strong group of candidates to choose from in the working group elections.

Unfinished business discussed in Reno included: a report on UWWG participation in the May 2001 Urban Wildlife Symposium held by the Arbor Day Foundation in Nebraska City; the upcoming (Dec 2003) 3rd International Wildlife Management Congress in Christ Church, New Zealand; the 2003 meeting of the North American Wildlife and Natural Resources Conference in Winston-Salem, North Carolina; and the Defenders of Wildlife Carnivores 2002 meeting.

The "Plants for Wildlife and Landscaping" project that several UWWG members have been working on is moving along. The material has been divided into regional areas (Southeast, Northeast, Southwest, Northwest). Details regarding the best distribution method to reach audiences outside the wildlife community are still being discussed.

UWWG members Lowell Adams and Larry VanDruff, along with Maciej Luniak of the Polish Academy of Sciences, are preparing an urban wildlife chapter for the 6th edition of *The Wildlife Techniques* Manual. To share feedback on the last

The Wildlife Society 9th Annual Conference

Mark your calendars if you haven't already, The 9th Annual Conference of The Wildlife Society will be held in Bismarck, North Dakota September 24-28, 2002. The more than 30 symposia, workshops, contributed papers, and poster sessions will address this year's conference theme: "Excellence in Wildlife Stewardship through Science and Education." On Tuesday, September 24th, the UWWG will offer the workshop "Media Self-Defense: Skills and Strategies for Wildlife Professionals" in conjunction with the Environmental Leadership Program. This workshop was suggested at the UWWG annual meeting in Reno as a way to provide wildlife professionals with the communications tools necessary for successful interactions with members of the media.

During the morning session, professional media consultant and former investigative reporter for the Miami Herald. Clarence Jones will discuss the skills and strategies wildlife professionals need to deal with the media successfully. Participants will have the opportunity to polish their skills during the afternoon session with on-camera exercises and peer critiques.

This workshop is free and full-day participants will receive Jones' book Winning with the News Media: A Self-Defense Manual When You're the Story. For more information on workshop content, contact

Upcoming and of Interest


Seth Riley will be chairing a session on urban carnivores at the upcoming Carnivores 2002 conference being organized by Defenders of Wildlife for November 17-20 in Monterey, California. The session will feature ten presentations in two sessions that will cover an entire morning. As currently scheduled, this will include talks on urban coyotes, raccoons, bear, fox, bobcats, raptors, and kit foxes. Also included will be talks on attitudes, as well as on relationships between such species as fishers, cats, and coyotes. The UWWG will sponsor "Trouble in the City: Human/Wildlife Conflicts in **Urban and Suburban North America**" as a special session of the **68**th **North** American Wildlife and Natural Resources Conference. The session, co-chaired by Craig Miller of the Illinois Natural History Survey and Jeff Duguay of Stephen F. Austin State University, will aim to increase understanding
